Moving from two to one dose in the HPV vaccine schedule for those aged under 25

<u>The change to the HPV vaccine programme from 1 September 2023 has been published</u>. One dose has been shown to be as effective as two at providing protection from HPV infection, so only one dose will be required by teenagers and GBMSM aged up to 25 to be fully protected. Those who have already received one dose of the vaccine prior to September 2023 will be considered fully vaccinated. GBMSM aged 25 to 45 will still require two doses and those living with HIV or known to be immunocompromised will still require three doses.

IIF Achievement – Declaration Process (L&SC)

PCN Leads in L&SC were contacted by the ICB on 26 June and advised the CQRS team had indicated that final achievement calculations would be made on that date and be available for declaration. This declaration would be required by 7 July for the 20 July payment date. We know that some PCNs have reservations about completing their declaration currently. This is owing to no further information being offered about how the ICB will be identifying and managing any actions that arise from the PCN exception report produced by local PCNs. This report articulated various anomalies regarding the IIF requirements and the hurdles preventing PCNs from achieving specific targets for 2022-23 due to no fault of their own.

We understand the ICB are still considering the exception report but at this stage, we have no update on any local discretion that may be applied because of this work. We would expect any adjustments to be made using ICB discretionary payments i.e. separate to the CQRS declaration but can appreciate that this may not be assurance enough for some. The ICB are encouraging PCNs to declare only if they are happy that the information reported in CQRS matches their own in year activity and information, to allow for the CQRS payments to be processed in July and that any discrepancies with the data should be highlighted to <u>england.lancsat-medical@nhs.net</u>. You may wish to contact the Primary Care Commissioning Team - Medical regarding any issues highlighted in the exception report relevant to your individual PCN.

RAG Rating

General Practice has reached <u>unsafe limits</u>. We would like to remind you that the LMC has been collecting RAG ratings scores from practices. The system in place is specifically designed to take up as little of your time as possible. We are asking you to send through your RAG rating scores by using the below indicators:

- **Green** Practice has capacity available to deal with referrals
- **Amber** Practice has limited capacity and may not be able to see everyone when they want to be seen
- **Red** Practice has no capacity and is not able to accept referrals or has run out of appointments

Please also notify us if your practice has any changes to the above indicators, we are not requesting a daily status, only a changed score. Please email all RAG ratings to <u>enquiries@nwlmcs.org.</u>

Patient registration at GP surgeries

<u>Anyone in England can register with a GP surgery</u>. There is no need to provide proof of ID, address, or immigration status to submit an application to register with a GP. Some Surgeries ask patients for supporting documentation as it can:

- help the surgery find medical records or transfer them from their current GP
- confirm that they live in the surgery's area (or "practice boundary") if they do not accept patients from outside this area

If they do not have a permanent address patients can still register using a temporary address or the address of the GP surgery.



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The digital <u>'Register with a GP surgery'</u> service has been designed to make it easier for people to register including those from vulnerable groups and documentation should not be a barrier to accessing care. A complementary paper form is also being made available, and both formats have been designed using feedback from those who are most at risk of exclusion and have the poorest health outcomes. NHSE has <u>worked with charities</u> such as Groundswell and Doctors of the World to do this.

New NHSE service to confirm GP registration status

From July, patients transferring GP practice will receive confirmation that their registration has been successful via a <u>new Notify a Patient service</u>. It aims to reduce GP admin burden by reducing the number of calls or visits from patients to confirm their registration status and is set to be rolled out for the majority of registrations by the end of the year.

Confirmation is sent via NHS App, email, SMS, or post. With messaging being handled centrally, practices may wish to consider how they manage the confirmations they currently send.
