SPS Guidance: Injectable Medicines Commonly Prescribed in Primary Care during COVID-19

UK Medicines Information's Specialist Pharmacy Service has produced updated guidance regarding the use of injectable medicines commonly prescribed in primary care during COVID-19.¹

The service has identified the top five most commonly prescribed injectable medicines in primary care and then produced guidance signposting to existing resources or put together their own advice on best management of patients during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The objective of this work is to:

- protect patients from unnecessary health care visits,
- to help preserve NHS capacity and
- to provide management options where patients need to self-isolate or shield.
