## Use of Medicines in Breastfeeding - MHRA Guidance, Information and Resources for Healthcare Professionals

The Medicines and Healthcare products Regulation Agency (MHRA) has produced useful information for patients, healthcare professionals and developers of new medicines about the use of medicines in breastfeeding.<sup>1</sup> The <u>guidance</u> states:

- Breastfeeding has long-term health benefits for both the mother and her baby
- Some medicines can pass from women through breastmilk to their baby
- Only small amounts of the medicine usually reach the baby and <u>most medicines can be used while</u> <u>breastfeeding</u>
- For some medicines, this may mean the baby should be monitored more often to make sure they are not harmed by the medicine whilst they are breastfed

## Advice to give to patients:

If you regularly take a medicine or have taken one during the late stages of your pregnancy, it is best to plan ahead. Talk to your doctor, nurse, or midwife about your breastfeeding options.

- Do not stop taking prescribed medicines without talking to your doctor
- If you need to take a medicine for the first time, talk to your doctor, nurse, or midwife about how you can safely breastfeed your baby
- Information about when a medicine must be avoided whilst breastfeeding, is available in the patient leaflet that accompanies a medicine
